POPPY SEED-ALMOND CHICKEN SALAD

Enjoy this fruity, flavorful salad as a light lunch or appetizer.

3 cups boiled chicken, chopped
½ cup chopped celery
½ cup chopped red onion
½ cup seedless red grapes, halved lengthwise

1 cup fresh pineapple, cubed
2 ounces sliced, toasted almonds
½ cup mayonnaise
½ cup poppy-seed dressing
Salt and pepper

Toss together the first six ingredients, adding salt and pepper to taste. Combine mayonnaise and poppy-seed dressing, mixing well. Pour the dressing mixture over the chicken mixture and stir well. Cover and refrigerate overnight to combine flavors. Serve over a bed of lettuce leaves with crackers, and top with slivered almonds.

Painted Privies

OUTHOUSES, also known as thunderboxes, are vanishing examples of rural Americana. To commemorate the structures, as well as bring awareness to Texas Hill Country artists, Sand Creek Post & Beam of Texas and Cedar Eaters of Texas have underwritten an eight-month traveling exhibition called Thunderbox Road: The Trail of Painted Privies.

The 12-piece exhibit featuring the talents of 12 regional artists debuted last October in Boerne, Texas, and will make its final appearance April 17 through May 11 at the Museum of Western Art in Kerrville, Texas. The pretty privies will be auctioned May 9 at the museum, with proceeds of the sale benefitting the PKU (Phenylketonuria) Medical Foundation and MoWA workshops.

The project was inspired by the book *Nature Calls, the History, Lore and Charm of Outhouses*, by Dottie Booth. The dozen participating artists were hand-selected for their diversity in style, medium and subject matter. Each interpreted their assignment differently—some reflecting on their
